Since the last issue, our General Manager, Steve Martin, has sadly left Insight Gloucestershire. Many of you knew him, and I'm sure will join all of us in wishing him all the very best for his retirement.

You might remember from our Autumn 2022 edition that our Trustees were worried about the financial security of our small charity in the long term. With Steve's departure, the Trustees have decided to commission neighbouring charity Sight Support West of England to oversee the day-to-day management of the charity and services, rather than appoint a new General Manager.

The Board believe that this step will be a really positive one for the charity - Sight Support are another local charity with a wealth of experience in running highly effective and client-centred services for people with sight loss. Working together in partnership will mean that we can reduce costs through sharing many functions (things such as IT, HR, Finance and Fundraising), whilst ensuring that Insight Gloucestershire remains an independent charity in its own right.

There will be no immediate change to our services. Insight Gloucestershire will continue to offer support to everyone affected by sight loss across the county. You will continue to see the same Sight

Loss Advisors in our Resource Centre and hubs, at the same locations. In the future, we will aim to have outreach hubs at more local locations, with more appointments available. But this will follow gradually. For now, please continue to use the services in the way you expect to! And do keep telling your friends and neighbours about us.

Study Breaks

Add-venture in Learning Residential Study Breaks

Add-venture in Learning organises residential study breaks for visually impaired adults, who enjoy learning in a relaxed way and socialising with likeminded people. This is a selffunded charity run by a volunteer committee of both sighted and visually impaired people.

Each visually impaired person is assisted by a sighted guide, and guide dogs are also welcome. Accommodation can vary from hotels to university halls, in different parts of the country. They usually run three study breaks a year, on various topics, generally lasting four nights. Study topics might include subjects such as history, literature, ecology or music. Course content involves talks and associated visits.

A visit To Cheltenham Town Football

If you've always enjoyed going to football matches, but think that having sight loss means you might not be able to do this any more, it might be worth investigating whether your club offers assistance to people with a disability. Recently, Bev and I were invited to Cheltenham Town Football Club to watch a match, and check out the accessibility of the ground. As we are both sight impaired, we wanted to find out how easy it is to take advantage of the assistance the club offers to people with a

disability and then share

our experience with you.

in the car park, which we found very easily. We were greeted by friendly members of staff, one of whom guided us to our seat. On the way, we were even allowed to avoid the turnstile and enter the stadium through a side door, as it was easier for us to manage.

When we got to our seats, we were both given a radio with earphones,

so we could listen to the BBC Radio Gloucestershire commentary. (This commentary is available for most home games.) The buttons on the radio were explained to us, and it was very simple to use. Even though the radio coverage had a

two second lag, it did not pose a problem and the commentary was

excellent. When we left our seats at half time, we were immediately asked by one of the stewards whether we needed any assistance.

After the match, we waited for a member of staff to come and meet us and take us to the exit. While we waited, we noticed a steward was assisting a supporter who was having difficulty negotiating the last few steps of the ground, because there was no handrail.

Despite there being a few issues, such as the corridor near the toilets being quite dark and the last few steps of the ground having no handrail, we had a thoroughly enjoyable day, with the bonus of Cheltenham Town winning 3-1 against Exeter City. We would definitely consider going back again to watch another match.

Warm and Well

Free energy efficiency advice

The advisors can give you tips on making simple changes in your home to save energy, help you access grants for home improvements, or arrange a free impartial home visit from one of Severn Wye's Community Energy Advisors. They can help you manage your energy debt, provide free energy-saving measures such as LED bulbs, and offer help understanding your energy bills. Severn Wye also works with other organisations in Gloucestershire and South Gloucestershire to issue financial support in emergency situations.

Talking Newspapers

Audio recordings of local news

If you are an avid listener of Talking Books, you may also enjoy listening to one of the free Talking Newspapers we have in this county.

Talking Newspapers are audio recordings of local news and events in your surrounding area. They are available to you if you are visually impaired or unable to read a traditional newspaper. The Talking Newspaper recordings are produced weekly by local volunteers and sent out to you free of charge.

There is a choice of five Talking Newspapers, depending on where you live:

Five Valley Sounds covers Stroud and surrounding towns and villages.

Cotswold Vale Talking Newspaper is based in Dursley and covers Gloucestershire and South Gloucestershire.

Corinium Talking News covers Cirencester and the surrounding towns and villages.

The Cotswold Listener covers Cheltenham, Tewkesbury, and North Cotswolds.

Gloucester Talking Newspaper covers the Gloucester area.

Online Sighted Guiding Training

For your Friends and Family

We thought you may be interested in knowing Guide Dogs is offering free, online, sighted guiding training, including an Introduction to Sighted Guide Training (suitable for people working or volunteering with the public), and Friends and Family Sighted Guide Training.

Friends and Family Sighted Guide Training will enable participants to help a friend or family member with sight loss to get out and about and do the things they enjoy.

This is an online, group session, where participants will learn to guide safely, or refresh the skills they already have, with expert support from Guide Dogs' staff. Participants can also speak to people who are in a similar situation to themselves, for mutual support.

These sessions are specifically tailored towards people, or networks, which support adults with sight loss, and participants can take part, either on their own, or with a group of friends and family. The

person with sight loss is welcome to attend the training session as well. Although this training is online, it can be delivered in-person if this is more appropriate. Participants aged 12 and over are welcome, but children should be accompanied by an adult.

In less than two hours, friends, and family of those with sight loss will:

- learn how to help their friend or family member deal with the obstacles they encounter every day, so they can get out and about with confidence.
- learn guiding techniques, such as the correct grip to use, walking through narrow spaces and how to detect changes on the ground and at head height.
- discuss some of the emotional consequences of sight loss.
- get an introduction to issues concerning access rights for people with sight loss.
- meet others with similar experiences and have the chance to share knowledge and offer support.

Eye Health Check

Looking after your sight

We all know how easy it is to put things off when we're busy, or tired. We might even have a "todo" list of jobs we're meaning to get round to, but the list just seems to get longer and longer. One thing we mustn't do, however, is to put-off looking after our eyes. Regular eye health tests with your local optician are vital to check for changes in your sight (if applicable) and ensure that your eyes are healthy.

The NHS recommends that we have an eye health test every two years, although in certain circumstances, someone might be advised to have a test more often than this.

The cost of these tests can vary, but many people will be eligible for a free eye health test. This includes:

- people over 60
- children and 16-18-year-olds in full-time education
- people registered as blind/severely sight impaired or sight impaired
- those with diabetes or glaucoma, or who have been advised they are at risk of glaucoma
- someone over 40 with a parent, sibling or child who has glaucoma
- those who are eligible for an NHS complex lens voucher
- people in receipt of certain benefits e.g. Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance, Income Support, Pension Credit Guarantee Credit

Some people may also qualify for help towards the cost of glasses. This includes children under 16, young people aged 16-18 who are in full-time education, and people who need complex lenses. People who receive certain benefits may also qualify for this, so speak to a member of staff when you go for your eye check.

In addition, someone who is eligible to receive a free eye health test <u>and</u> has a physical or mental disability which prevents them leaving their home unaccompanied, may be able to have their eyes tested at home. Contact your usual optician to see if they provide this service and if not, they may be able to recommend somewhere that does.

If you are wondering whether you still need to go for an eye health test if you have a sight impairment already, the answer is yes. One of the questions we often get asked at Insight is "I've been diagnosed with dry macular degeneration, but I know there's no treatment for this, what's the point in having an eye health test?". Sadly, it is possible to have two eye conditions at one time, for instance macular

degeneration and glaucoma, so a two-yearly check with your local optician is a good way of making sure there is nothing else going on.

The equipment at a high street optician is so sophisticated now, that you may even be offered an Optical Coherence Tomography scan (OCT). This non-invasive procedure uses light waves to provide detailed 3D images of the inside of your eye, including the layers of the retina. Generally, this involves an extra cost of around £10.

Hopefully, this article may have reminded you to go and book an eye health test if you haven't had one for some time and maybe you can also encourage a friend or family member to make sure they are having regular checks as well.





The Theatre Group



Theatre shows with audio description

Insight Gloucestershire has had a successful theatre group for some years now, although during the pandemic of course, this activity was put on hold. Since then, however, we've been back with a vengeance and the theatre group seems to be more popular than ever.

Each year, the group organiser, Mary, liaises with the Everyman Theatre, Cheltenham, to choose approximately six shows that our sight impaired clients might like to attend. The shows could be comedy, drama or even musicals, but they must be suitable to be audio described. Audio description allows people with sight loss to follow what is happening on stage when none of the actors are speaking. For instance, the audio describer might say something like "the man walks towards the door, looking sad". The audio description is played through a headset, which is given out at the start of the performance. We've had some lovely feedback from people who have said the audio description is amazing and they wouldn't be able to attend a show without it.

Whenever possible, the Everyman also offers a touch tour to our sight impaired theatre-goers and their partners/carers. This allows people to have a closer look at what is on the stage and handle some of the props or costumes. Our clients have said this gives them a good idea of what the stage setting is like and enables them to work out how everything comes together. Because the touch tour takes place a couple of hours before the show starts, the group also stays for lunch at Matchams restaurant at the theatre, where they have a choice of one or two courses. Alternatively, people can make their own arrangements for lunch and come back just before the performance starts.

We have attended some amazing shows at the Everyman - in fact, one of our members described 'Titanic, the Musical' as one of the best things they've ever seen, so if you would like to join in the fun, get in touch!

We presently have an excellent team of volunteers who assist with the theatre trips; however, we are looking for one or two people who are willing to be in charge of the group while they are at the theatre. This would free up Mary for other projects, although she would, of course, work alongside the volunteers for a few shows while they got used to the job.
